PUBLIC COMMENTS/RESPONSES: (Non-agenda Items Only)

1. Tom Rebman, resident, expressed concern about the homeless population as it related to the COVID-19 pandemic. He asked that no homeless camps be evicted while under the guidance of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), unless it was crime related. He also requested assistance for the homeless with water for showers and guidance with funding sources.

Mrs. Morrell advised that the City was working with the Brevard County and the Brevard Homeless Coalition. Mayor Capote said that the information needed to be disseminated to the public. Mr. Anderson said that the smartest option would be to have the individuals remain where they were until April 30th. Deputy Mayor Johnson agreed that the last thing Council would want was to have people moving from one place to another. Mr. Anderson added that there were organizations assisting the homeless with water, masks and tents and were advising the individuals to stay in place.

PUBLIC COMMENTS/RESPONSES: (Non-agenda Items Only)

There were no public comments.

BUSINESS:

1. Discussion of possible ordinance changes related to COVID-19. (Councilman Bailey)

Mr. Bailey wanted to modify the Code of Ordinances to make it more friendly towards urban farming. He had very serious concerns about the possible economic downturn as a result of the virus outbreak. He wanted to ensure there was as much locally produced food as possible in case there were any shortages or interruptions. Mr. Bailey said that residents were able to have their own gardens, but it took planning and effort. He felt it may be difficult to manage a community-based garden, but he was hopeful that residents would become more interested. He suggested that if an ordinance was in place, staff could provide information or brochures in order to get the message out to the residents. He felt that Council needed to act quickly.

Mr. Santiago mentioned the ONE Community Program, and which flourished into the Community Gardening Program. He agreed with Councilman Bailey as far as self-

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sustaining as long as it did not conflict with the regulations of Single-Family Residential zoning. He said that although Council was able to enact an ordinance that permitted four (4) chickens in Single-Family Residential zoning, there were a lot of concerns at that time.

Mayor Capote said a resident pushed for the community garden at Nemo Circle then he moved out of the area and the garden was no longer properly maintained. Mayor Capote expressed concern about the complaints that may be received regarding noise from the roosters, maintenance of the coops, odors, etc. He suggested that Councilman Bailey review the past discussions when the ordinance regarding the chickens was proposed and had no issue with reviewing any language brought forward. He added that the item would have to be presented to the Planning and Zoning Board (P&Z).

Mr. Anderson felt the item should be considered by P&Z when there were no longer any social distancing and capacity requirements. He encouraged parents to teach their children that produce did not come in packages at the store. He said that chickens were a necessity, but if not taken care of properly, it could invite rodents and pests that the neighbors would be subjected to as well. Mr. Anderson supported Councilman Bailey's request to bring suggested changes to Council.

Mr. Anderson asked that "Council Reports" be placed on the next agenda. Council concurred.

Mr. Johnson supported Councilman Bailey's request. He added that if a community garden was proposed, long-term maintenance would have to be a topic of discussion.

Mr. Bailey said that if there was a food shortage, community gardens and personal gardens would be difficult to police. He felt that protein was the biggest issue facing residents. He said that four (4) hens would only produce enough eggs for two (2) people and he wanted the people to have as many options as possible, including goats. Mr. Bailey asked for the proposal to be heard by P&Z as soon as possible and would discuss same with the City Manager.

Mr. Bailey asked that everyone start thinking about the budgetary effects of this pandemic on the City. He wanted to have conversations about being better prepared, fiscally, moving forward. He felt that revenues would be decreased next year, and the City should only fulfill its essential needs. Mayor Capote said that Council needed to be aware of its decisions regarding future budgets and how employees would be affected.

RE: Award of Invitation for Bid #29-0-2020/JG Road Bond Paving

Unit 42 & Garvey

SUMMARY:

Unit 42 and Garvey are included in the Year 1 (Phase 1) Road Paving Project endorsed by the Infrastructure Advisory Oversight Board on January 28, 2019 and then approved by City Council on March 7, 2019. Staff bundled these two units to be advertised together for the paving since they are within the same southwest quadrant. The project consists of road reconstruction using Full Depth Reclamation (FDR) for Unit 42 and Garvey Road. In addition to the Full Depth Reclamation (FDR) for Garvey Road and streets within Unit 42, Unit 42 will also include milling and paving as well as thin lift overlay. Unit 42 has 62,699 linear feet (LF) of thin lift paving, 27,490 LF of milling and paving and 76,051 LF of FDR. Garvey Road has 10,733 LF of FDR.

Four (4) bids were received. The Procurement Department staff reviewed the four bids for responsiveness. Public Works Department evaluated the bids for responsibility and ability to perform the scope of construction. The Department found the lowest responsive bid to be acceptable. Asphalt Paving Systems has provided FDR work for the City under four piggyback contracts and one competitive solicitation in the last four years.

The City's Engineer's estimate for these two projects is \$9,695,675. The lowest bid is \$7,544,652.43. Public Works Engineering staff has reviewed the pay items, proposed subcontractors, equipment list and references and is satisfied with the evidence provided by the

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contractor. Staff recommends Asphalt Paving System, Inc. Zephyrhills, Florida for award of IFB

#29-0-2020/FG - Road Bond Paving - Unit 42 and Garvey.

Local Preference was not applied to this project because all bids exceeded the one million-dollar

threshold amount.

Staff is also recommending a 5% contingency fund of \$377,000 to cover any unforeseen change

orders which is typical for construction projects. The City's Procurement Policy allows the Chief

Procurement Officer to approve change orders up to 10%; any change order in excess of 10% will

be brought before Council for approval. Any funds remaining once the project has been closed will

be transferred back to Road Bond fund balance.

RE: Approval to Modify the FY 20 Position Control Plan

SUMMARY:

Finance: Reclassified one (1) Customer Service Representative positions to Customer Account Specialist position. This allows staff to provide service of all the functions of the Revenue Division rather than waiting for another staff member to become available. Downgraded a vacant Billing and Collections Manager position to a Customer Service Coordinator position. There is no cost involved with these changes.

EDEA: Title change for vacant Community Development Administrator position to Housing Administrator. The change from better reflects the roles and responsibilities of the position. There is no cost involved with this change.

GROWTH MANAGEMENT: Downgraded a vacant Planner II position to a Planner position (formerly Planner I) with a \$4,777 savings. Reclassified filled Planner II position, Grade U (\$46,284-\$69,467) to Senior Planner Grade W (\$49,038-\$73,634). This will have an approximate \$3,027 annual impact. Title and pay grade change from the vacant Planner III position, Grade X (50,478-\$75,811) to Principal Planner, Grade Z (\$\$53,488-\$80,364). This will have an approximate \$3,500 annual impact. Title changes for Planner I, II and III positions to Planner, Senior Planner and Principal Planner keep with the standards of the Planning profession. With increased job duties and requirements, the pay grade changes were warranted for Senior Planner and Principal Planner. These changes have an approximate \$1,761 annual impact. Current and future funding for these positions is possible due to staff vacancies.

SUMMARY:

On May 18, 2017, City Council adopted Resolution 2017-20 approving the Local Housing Assistance Plan (LHAP) for Fiscal Years 2017-2018, 2018-2019, and 2019-2020. The City's LHAP provides a plan for expending State Housing Initiative Partnership (SHIP) housing grant funds, to include eligible activities (i.e. Owner-Occupied Rehabilitation and Purchase Assistance Programs), maximum award thresholds for such activities/programs, and identifying set asides for income-eligibility and special need.

The LHAP provides for a maximum award of \$50,000 per homeowner under the SHIP Owner-Occupied Rehab Program, which addresses repairs or improvements needed for safety and sanitary habitation and/or correction of substantial code violation for very-low, low, and moderate-income residents. Staff is requesting to exceed this maximum by another \$10,000 for a total of \$60,000 eligible to make necessary repairs to 152 Donald Ave NE. Upon rehabilitation to the home, the contractor identified significant drainage issues which will continue to negatively impact the repairs made to the home through the SHIP Rehab Program. The drainage issues are a result of the poor grading of the backyard as well as the negative slope of neighboring yards towards property located at 152 Donald Ave NE. The contractor has identified that the additional cost to repair drainage is estimated to be \$5,850, which would cause the client to exceed the maximum as approved in the LHAP.

SUMMARY:

Following Hurricane Irma in 2017, the City was approached by residents of Cimmaron Circle requesting assistance from the City regarding perpetual flood damage to homes which were built within a high-risk flood zone. The City's FEMA Coordinator and Housing Administrator identified available grant funds through FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) and began discussing interest and willingness of the residents to participate in a Voluntary Home Buyout Program.

At its July 19, 2018 Regular Council Meeting, Council authorized the City to apply for grant funds through FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) in the amount of \$1,680,000, for which there is a required 25 percent local match. The HMGP is intended to reduce or eliminate long-term risk to people and property from future disasters. To support its application, the City's Housing Division obtained signed notices of voluntary interest forms from 13 residents of Cimmaron Circle, dated December 10, 2018.

On July 1, 2019, the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity's (DEO) Office of Disaster Recovery (DR), responsible for administering a Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) program funded by the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD), published a Request for Applications to the Rebuild Florida's Voluntary Home Buyout (VHB) Program. The VHB Program serves to acquire properties that are in high-risk flood areas to help reduce the impact of future disaster. At the Regular Council Meeting held on August 13, 2019, City



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Council authorized the submission of an application for CDBG-DR for funds in the amount of \$684,179 to serve as the required 25 percent local match for FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP).

In December 2019, the City received notification from DEO regarding a CDBG-DR grant award for the full request amount of \$684,179. Subsequently, the City received the CDBG-DR Subrecipient Grant Agreement for a period of 24 months from the date of execution calling for timely expenditure of funds, which are subject to federal requirements and therefore, shall principally benefit low- to moderate-income persons in a manner that ensures that at least 70 percent of the grant awarded benefits such persons. Additionally, the Agreement calls for certain deliverables based upon an established timeline, to include program design and implementation for VHB, completion of homeowner buyout and subsequently demolition of structures.

The acceptance of this funding is contingent upon the City's award of HMGP funds from FEMA. The City has not yet received a notice of award from FEMA.

SUMMARY:

Attached for your information is the monthly financial report which will provide you with an overview of the City's financial activities which occurred through February 29, 2020. February is the fifth month of the fiscal year and represents 42% of the annual budget.

FEBRUARY 2020 CASH & INVESTMENTS HIGHLIGHTS

General Fund

Total General Fund cash and investments are up \$10,140,742.58 or 41.4% from the same period last year. General Fund Cash & Investments at 2/28/20 totaled \$34,637,785.50.

In comparison to the prior year in February General Fund revenues increased by \$1,716,414.88 while expenditures decreased by \$3,111,798.61.

Transportation Impact Fee Fund

Transportation Impact Fee cash and investments is up \$206,845.07 from one year ago. Impact Fee Revenues received can only be used for expanded capacity, not road maintenance.

Road Maintenance Fund

Cash balances in the Road Maintenance Fund has increased from \$1,026,373.57 in February 2019 to \$2,163,521.28 million in February 2020, an increase of \$1,137,147.71.

Stormwater Utility Fund

Cash and investment balances in the Stormwater Fund on February 28, 2020, totaled \$11.0 million.

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Revenue collections in FY20 through the end of February totaled \$8,584,782.99. Revenue

collections included assessment collections of \$8,438,872.17 collected through the Brevard County

Tax Collector Office and \$45,362.33 in Stormwater Service Fees previously billed by the Palm Bay

Utility.

2018 LOGT NOTE Proceeds

Of the \$8.9 million in funds borrowed and received in February 2018 for road construction at the new

I-95 exit, plus interest earned, \$2.1 million was unspent as of February 29, 2020. A total of \$1.3

million is encumbered for drawdown as work progresses on the project.

2019 GO Bond Proceeds

On August 15, 2019, the City closed on the first series of GO Bonds for road improvement throughout

the City. A total of \$53,971,435 was received after allowing for issuance cost, underwriter discount

and bond insurance expenses, estimated at \$837,376.25. The GO Bonds cash and investments

totaled \$51,087,122.38 at 2/29/20.

Citywide

The City's total cash and investments portfolio, increased to \$135,165,929.21 from \$115,960,866.19,

an increase of \$19,205,063.02 or 16.6%, from February 2019 to February 2020. The increase in

Citywide revenues is primarily attributable to an increase in Ad Valorem Tax receipts, the return of

SHIP Grant dollars, utility related revenues, Building Fund, and Employee Benefit Fund balances.

This is the first year Ad Valorem collections for the GO Bonds have been received as part of the tax

collections transmitted to the City in the first guarter of the fiscal year. Proceeds from the 2019 GO

Bonds Proceeds are maintained separately from the City's total cash and investments portfolio

balance.
